Archbishop Bruce Stavert, Anglican Bishop of the Diocese of Quebec co-celebrated the Palm Sunday service at the Church of St. Andrew & St. George in Baie-Comeau on April 1st with Monseigneur Pierre Morissette of the catholic diocese of Baie-Comeau. The bilingual service featured Palm Sunday readings, distribution of palms, the passion reading and Holy Communion.

Mgr Morissette is the President of the Assemblée des évêques du Québec and sometimes meets up with Archbishop Bruce at Ecumenical Catholic-Anglican meetings. The two had previously co-celebrated a Palm Sunday ecumenical service in 2001 at the church.

April 1st was also the Archbishop's birthday; following the service a reception was held and he was treated to birthday wishes and cake. His wife Dianna, who accompanied the Archbishop on this trip, helped lead the hymn singing and mingled with parishioners during the reception.

Odyssée traveled all the way to Fermont to visit students on Wednesday, March 14.




FES NEWSPAPER

As of mid January, a large group of Ms Kathy Fequet's C3 Y1 (Grade 5) students of Flemming Elementary, has been working on a school newspaper. The project is part of an entrepreneurial contest, aimed at developing entrepreneurial skills amongst the youth of our English community. The students have set up a monthly newspaper called the 'F.E.S. News'. The idea of a school newspaper was generated from the students and much of the organization and information has come from them. After many hours of hard and dedicated work, the students finally printed their first newspaper on Feb 27, 2007. A total of 69 copies were sold. Initially the students' aim was to write about issues concerning the student body of Flemming. They wish to improve school life and create something that is unique and memorable for their years at Flemming. In hopes of helping other children in the community, the students decided to give half the proceeds of the newspaper to sick children at the hospital. The other half will go for printing and materials. The idea of helping others in the community is uniquely theirs and has taken a major role in the purpose of the sales of the newspaper. The students have been working on different ways to promote and sell the newspaper in order to raise more money and possibly help more children. The students have developed a real sense of responsibility and are motivated by their cause. The group is already thinking of continuing the project next year. They hope to raise money to buy a camera for their group as well as perhaps set up a small wish foundation. I am pleased with the work and generosity that these students have demonstrated.

At the end of the school day they had completed homework, played video, computer games and finished major art work for the school Houses. Entertainment continued throughout the evening with a good game of basketball, school wide hide n' seek, followed by a movie. Everyone slept in the gym but didn't get to sleep until 1:00 am. Bright and early the next morning at 6 o'clock, students enjoyed a light breakfast and got ready for the school activity day at Mont Ti-Basse. Participants raised \$ 365.00 and now have a real sense of what hunger is like. The money will go to projects organized by World Vision, in both Canada and around the world. Did you know that just a \$1 a day will feed and care for a child? The amount raised is enough to feed and provide necessary care to a child for a whole year.




