

N.S.C.A. The Beginning

In the early 1980's, two chapters of Alliance Québec were organized on the North Shore – one in the community of Baie-Comeau, the other in the communities of Sept-Iles and Port Cartier. As the Anglophone communities decreased in population, it became increasingly difficult to fulfill the constitutional requirements of chapter status. So in the early 1990's, Anglophones on the North Shore were represented in Alliance Québec through two community organizations.

In the late 1990's, with the creation of the Provisional Council to organize linguistic school boards in the east of the province, discussions began between a North Shore Steering Committee and the Committee for Anglophone Social Action (CASA) in the Gaspé. During the year 1999, four community animators were hired to research and survey their respective communities in order to compile a needs and services assessment.

On September 23rd, 2000 the North Shore Community Association was established at a founding meeting in Port Cartier. With nearly 60 people in attendance, the English-speaking population of the North Shore voted unanimously in favour of starting a Regional Association other than being a chapter of CASA. The steering had accomplished the first steps of what they set out to do.... NSCA now flies on its own. The Executive Committee held its first Executive Meeting on December 8th, 2000 in Baie-Comeau and the first Annual General Meeting was held on November 10th, 2001 in Port-Cartier.

Info on Access to Health & Social Services

As clearly stated by the Ministry of Health & Social Services their definition of an English-speaking person is *«An English-speaking person is one who, in his relations with an institution dispensing health or social services feels more comfortable in expressing his needs in the English language and receiving the services in that language»*

The Quebec Health Act specifically states that English-speaking persons are entitled to receive health and social services in the English language and Section 348 of the Act requires that all Agencies develop a program of access to health and social services in the English language for the English-speaking population for its region. The program must take into account the organizational structure, human, material and financial resources of the institutions providing the service.

What is the purpose of an Access Program?

It is to ensure access of English-speaking persons to a range of health and social services that is provided in the English language by the institution, in their local area or region and if required in another region.

What are the objectives?

The access program aims to identify the health and social services needs of the English-speaking population of the region and to identify the health and social services requirements. To indicate the service providers (institutions) that is required to provide health and social services in the English language including identifying the means of access to services that are offered in English.

What institutions in the Administrative region (09) must accommodate the Access Program?

Remember we should request services in English as often as possible; otherwise our health establishments get the impression that offering a service in English is unnecessary!

Info-Santé Hotline Revamped

The Quebec government will be revamping its Info-Santé information service to a province-wide telephone number: 811

Similar to the 411 directory assistance or 911 emergency service, the 811 hotline will link callers with a nurse 24/7. The 811 service will replace the Info-Santé telephone number that is linked to community health clinics. Eventually, the service will expand to provide Info-médicament and Info-services for medication and mental issues.

The hotline is for anyone with concerns on health issues and accessible from any telephone. The 811 number is expected to be functioning in Montreal by March or April, the rest of the regions are to be hooked up by December.

To establish a solid Community Learning Centre, one of the first steps is to put in place a local committee composed of diverse organizational representatives and individuals who play an active role, especially in the English Community. Through a collaborative approach, the committee determines the orientations, the priorities and the delivery of services needed for the implementation and the sustained development of the CLC. Sometimes it will act in an advisory fashion and at other times, through their organization and contacts, some members will set up activities in collaboration with the CLC. To reflect this double role, the committee is referred to as the Partnership Table.

Members forming the committee come from different backgrounds therefore bringing to the centre a wide variety of knowledge and experience which will surely benefit users of all ages. Some members are already long time collaborators involved with the school, known as "Friends of BCHS" while others bring new sources of collaboration. Various groups are involved, such as the youth represented by a member of the Student Council, as well as a retired English-speaking citizen interested in the development of the centre.

Cegep de Sept-lies News

For the last two years, a group of students from the Cegep de Sept-Iles has been working with a group of students from Vanier College in Montreal on a "virtual" team-teaching project. This innovative and ambitious project was implemented in two of the humanities courses but may soon be used in a wide variety of disciplines. The college's IT department put together an impressive array of communications technology that opens up a whole new world of possibilities for both the staff and the students. Tech-

nology used included: Skype internet phone system, *DecClic 2* (a learning platform to organize the class in an on-line environment), *Platforme Via* (a visual conferencing system), *Google* documents and spreadsheets (a place where students can work together on the same document from anywhere they have internet access), *iChat* virtual window, Learning Objects (games and simulations that promote learning) such as *SECRA 3*, *IAT*, *Tickle Tests*, and *Windows Movie Maker*.

Student reaction has been positive on every level. Professors have noted improved attendance and stronger participation and involvement in class activities. Students have also demonstrated an interest and enthusiasm not only for the interaction with the technologies, but with their peers in the big city as well. Our students are now confronted with big-city issues and are gaining a better understanding of the world as a whole in the process. [The] "world views course helps us to understand the way different cultures or generations see the world. ... It helps us understand the rest of the world by their thoughts and their visions of things.....If we can understand [that]...the world could be far better than it is now," said Caroline Neveu, student at the Cegep de Sept-Iles.

Last fall, students went on a road trip to Montreal and attended classes at Vanier for a day. And this winter, a group of students from Vanier are planning to make the long journey to Sept-Iles so we can show them what a great place we have here!

All in all, the project has been getting rave reviews from all parties involved. Originally intended as a two-year stint, both Vanier and Sept-Iles are interested in pursuing the experiment further and are currently working on an extension to the project.

Let's hope that the powers that be are open to the idea! We certainly are...!

The PPO did a wonderful job once again with



Despite the chilly -20 degree temperatures, an impending snowstorm, and a broken water heating pipe two days before, parishioners and friends gathered at the Church of St. Andrew & St. George in Baie-Comeau on December 15th at what has now become the traditional Christmas carol sing-song and community potluck supper.

This year, the event was marked by three special events. First off, the service incorporated special prayers to commemorate and give thanks for 70 years of mission and ministry in the region and municipality. The first service ever held was in December 1937. It was noted that the church took less than a year to build, and even less to pay off its debt, thanks in large part to the Ontario Paper Company that donated most of the building supplies and labour.

Secondly, the Scouts, who have been actively associated with the church since the 1950s, presented the proceeds from their annual Christmas tree sales. The church is looking into using the funds from selling the 150 or so trees to help sponsor youth and family-oriented initiatives.

Thirdly, thanks to a deanery grant, the church is now able to sponsor a youth musical ensemble from Baie Comeau High School under the direction of Maria-Teresa Mastrocola (church organist and school music teacher). During the service, eight young musicians with recorders led the congregation in carol singing and played a couple of musical interludes. We were so grateful to have them since our organist took sick minutes before the service started; the young musicians seamlessly took up their role and performed flawlessly, leading the 45 people present in traditional carols. We look forward to future performances by the ensemble in the church and community.

Once again, our potluck supper was well-attended; the largest table was occupied by about 15 teens (not surprisingly they are always first in line for the main course and dessert!). It is a great opportunity for them to get together and catch up on each other's news. The supper also gave us an opportunity to hold a fundraising event. Raffling off six donated prizes from parishioners and friends, we raised \$200 to donate to PWRDF's relief efforts in Bangladesh.

Many thanks must go out to all those who lent a hand in preparing the food, working in the kitchen and to Jody Lessard and Marilyn Durepos who festively decorated the hall.
