## Fourth instalment of the Road trip through the North Shore by Marc Deslauriers

Our Stay in Baie-Comeau is now over and we are about to undertake the longest lap of this road trip, through Caniapiscau to Fermont. The road that leads to Fermont is the 389 and is an interesting one to say the least. We leave the 138 near Baie-Comeau and head due north. Just for the sake of conversion, it is as far from Baie-Comeau to Fermont as it is from Baie-Comeau to Montreal . Just from the junction of the 138 to Manic 2 there are 122 curves, like going nowhere real fast. Manic 2 is a feat of engineering as it is 71 metres high and has a basin of 125 sq km. It is a sight and one of the first of the Manic hydro system and one that was built between 2 mountains. Since we need to get on, we leave here and travel 215kms from Baie-Comeau to the Largest Arch Type dam in the World, Manic 5 or

Daniel Johnson Dam. The Basin is 1973 square kilometres and the dam proper is 141 metres high. It is a remarkable feat of engineering and needs to be seen as such. Trivia maybe, but Manic 5 is the most photographed item on the North Shore.

We now move on towards our midway point to Fermont and that is the Relais Gabriel. This Multi-service station holds an Outfitter, Rooms, a Restaurant and Convenience store. It is the last stop for gas before Fermont. This place is run by the remarkable Savard sisters. They are very hospitable and will go to great lengths to make your stay enjoyable. Once you start climbing back on the gravel road, you will notice the Mounts Groulx. We have been on gravel now for quite a while and at 390 kilometres we hit blacktop and the now erased town of Gagnon. This once thriving town of 4000 inhabitants is now grass, trees, and a few streets. The town

was founded in 1960 and QCM stopped all operations in the early 1980's. The last person there turned off the lights on June 30, 1985.

We continue our tour along the 389 with lakes, rivers and the occasional ptarmigan along the road. We are getting closer and will soon arrive at Fire Lake some 90 kilometres north of Gagnon.

Fire Lake, the first of the mines, is a twisted road, with 11 crossings. The scenery is low bush for the most part with lakes on either side of the

road. I tell myself that it is only 60 more kilometres, so I drive on. All of a sudden there is hardtop, asphalt for the purists, and up looms the mine at Mount Wright. A short drive down the tarmac and I get my first view of the windscreen at Fermont. The windscreen was erected in the early 1970's to protect against the north wind. It is 1.3 kilometres long and varies from 20 metres to 50 metres high.

Inside the wall are the municipal offices, police station, swimming pool, schools, arena, hotel, government offices and a shopping mall, just to mention a few. It is a remarkable structure built above the 53<sup>rd</sup> parallel. The people are extremely friendly and everybody seems to know each other. The population as of 2006 was 2471. Breathtaking and unique, words are not enough to describe the feeling of being almost as far north as you can drive but some 20 kilometres away is Labrador City.

Enough for now, and until next time happy travels.

#### **Maasdam Visits Sept-Iles**



On Tuesday, May 19, Sept-Iles welcomed the first cruise ship in it's history. The Maasdam came from Fort Lauderdale, Florida and was heading to Montreal. . It carried 1300 passengers and 500 crew members. The ship was docked in Sept-Iles for the day.

There were many activities going on at the port to entertain the visitors as well as visits to the Innu camp and a trip to Allouette.

This was the first cruise ship to Sept-Iles, but there are more scheduled to come in the future.

#### Health and Social Services Developments....

During the last two years, the North Community Association has been working with the Community Health and Social Services Network (CHSSN) towards developing our knowledge on public health and access programs. Through projects under the "We Can Act" Community Public Health Strategy, we have improved our capacity in understanding the specific needs of the English-speaking communities of the North Shore. Upon completion of these projects, the Association not only increased their knowledge within the health and social services sector, but developed valuable partnerships and also enhanced the visibility of the Anglophone population within our local health establishments and the Regional Agency on the North Shore.

In June 2009, the Regional Advisory Committee for the Access Program held its first meeting of the 2009-2010 year. Mr. Marc Deslauriers was elected Chair and Ms. Jody Lessard elected as Vice-chair. A composition of 7 members, including representation from the Regional Health and Social Services Agency, will serve a two year mandate in working towards ensuring access of English-speaking persons to a range of health and social services provided by the designated institutions of the North Shore.

Reacting on the indicated needs of the population, the Association has prioritized the importance of creating awareness of the present regional access program for Anglophones. Presently we are working in collaboration with the Regional Agency in developing an informational pamphlet on the North Shore Access Program. Pamphlets are scheduled for public distribution in September 2009.

With keeping priorities in mind, the Association will establish a community health network that focuses on addressing the concerns of the community. This network is funded under the CHSSN Networking Partnership Initiative (NPI). The first phase of the project, commencing in September 2009, covers a 6 month period and will employ one coordinator and a community liaison person, on a part-time basis. Through this established network we could encourage greater participation of the English-speaking communities in decision-making processes, implement activities that ensure long-term development in the health sector and increase the accessibility of the health and social services within the region. **Baie-Comeau, May 8, 2009** – The current situation in Québec with regard to influenza A (H1N1) calls for increased vigilance by the health and social services network. In this special context, the Agence de la santé et des services sociaux de la Côte-Nord wishes to inform the public that it has implemented the appropriate preventive measures and interventions, with the collaboration of the regional public health department and all the health institutions on the territory. The goal is to ensure that citizens have continuous access to care and social services.

The President and Executive Director, Mrs Nicole Demers, is very satisfied with the way the entire network came together to prepare for the passage to a Level 5 alert to a potential influenza A (H1N1) pandemic. "We had a very good response. It's an indication of good preparation and dedication on the part of staff, she said. I want to thank all workers in the network for their individual and collective contributions to this mobilization."

Local civil protection coordination centres (health mission) have been set up in each institution on the territory covered by the agency, in accordance with departmental directives. The agency's regional coordination centre is in constant contact with the civil protection coordination centre of the ministère de la Santé et des Services sociaux, which coordinates all the activities included in the *Québec Pan-demic Influenza Plan - Health Mission*.

The Agence emphasizes that respiratory hygiene measures and frequent hand washing with soap and water must be applied at all times, and that vigilance is required to help curb virus spread in the population, particularly the spread of influenza A (H1N1) virus.



There was a real sense of hope and joy tinged with a little sadness at the 81st Ordinary Synod held at Laval University in Quebec City on May 28-31. Thursday afternoon began with Bishop Dennis meeting with the clergy and lay incumbents. He officially cancelled all pervious licenses and issued new ones along with new letters of appointment. These letters set out his expectations and explain how the license holders will be evaluated.

As always the first session of Synod began with the Eucharist. Archbishop Bruce Stavert officiated and then he addressed the members of Synod saying he was pleased with how well things had gone since the last meeting, what a good diocesan bishop Dennis will be and with a twinkle in his eye how happy he was not to have to chair this meeting. He then handed over the gavel and the synod to Bishop Dennis.

On Saturday evening a Gala Dinner was held celebrating the ministry of Archbishop Bruce and Diana Stavert. An almost life-size photo of the Archbishop picturing him on the occasion of his ordination to the priesthood in 1965 marked the entrance to the dining room. The MC

for the evening was Canon Graham Jackson who had lined up speakers to reflect on various parts of their time in our diocese.

On Pentecost Sunday the Eucharist was held at the Cathedral. The congregation of 350 included other diocesan bishops, the Archbishop, Cardinal Marc Ouellette and clergy and lay from across the diocese. They were all there to witness to the enthronement of Dennis Paul Drainville as the Twelfth Lord Bishop of Quebec.

The Synod was very upbeat despite the many challenges the diocese is facing. The diocese is moving forward with faith, love and hope. Bishop Dennis has instilled a renewed vigour within the vast diocese. The north shore Anglican congregations in Baie-Comeau and Seven Islands are already engaged in the process of discerning our leadership, stewardship and mission objectives for the next few years.
