THE LEGENDS LIVE ON

A ten-minute radio play podcast

Students in Secondary C-2-2 at Baie Comeau High School teamed up with playwright Greg McArthur, producer Mark Goldman and Blue Metropolis Literary Foundation to write a ten-minute radio play. Students had a number of workshops at school in early January with Greg and Mark and then were charged with the writing of the play. The genre was new to the students and teacher. Writing a radio play must include not only the script, but sound effects and music. Essential to the radio play is the plot, characterization and keeping your audience in mind at all times.

We brainstormed a number of topics. Since it was to be written in the History and Citizenship Education course, the plot had to have some sort of historical slant to it. We chose to focus on a group of scouts who needed to spend an unscheduled overnight stay at abandoned hunting camp. We were able to weave two legends into the storyline. The principle one was that of a local legend involving Colonel Robert McCormick (founder of Baie-Comeau) and his partner Romeo Parent. Legend has it that they were lost in the woods in the Shelter Bay area (present-day Port-Cartier) and were perilously close to running out of supplies. By shooting their hunting rifles into the air, a local Amerindian by the name of TiBasse St-Onge came to their rescue.

We also chose to incorporate the famous French Canadian legend entitled "La Chasse Galerie". It is based on loggers in northern Quebec making a pact with the devil to return for one night to their hometown in a flying canoe.

The initial story line was chosen since many of the students had been involved in the scouting movement at one time or another. The two legends were selected to represent the French fact of our community and the strong tie between McCormick and the town's history and development.

It took almost three weeks to write the script; after numerous edits, we searched for sound effects (everything from canoes, to creaking doors, to nature sounds) and music (for ambient effect). That took another week along with one final edit. The recording itself took another couple of class periods. The files (all recorded on a digital tape recorder) were sent to a sound engineer in Montreal along with the script for final production.

We are all very pleased with the outcome. We are grateful to Ray Venables, ESSB RECIT animator, Max Coté of the BCHS CLC and to ESSB for supporting such a high quality pedagogical initiative that seamlessly integrated technology into a tremendous radio play.

Debra Laurie Receives the 'Order of Merit Nord-Côtier'



Debra Laurie was born in Quebec, on a nice day in the month of May 1956 and was transplanted to Port-Cartier in 1978; it is in this town that we meet Debra Laurie. We found her teaching high school level at Riverview School. The people of Port Cartier have appreciated this committed and dedicated volunteer for many years. Debra has a fine eye for detail and beauty, and she was recognized as the 'Community Gardner' on March 8th, 2008.

Ms. Laurie was also awarded recognition by the Eastern Shores School Board for her involvement in education for the past 25 years. Since the beginning of her involvement on the North Shore, this apprehensive educator understood that the best way to start in this new town would be to get involved with the causes which hold her co-citizens at heart. Without delay, she offers her help as a member of the parish choral of Saint-Alexandre; a 20 year commitment! Her dynamic participation within the community, she accepts to work as churchwarden.

Within this new group, she successfully plays the role of secretary and later as president. When the Saint-Alexandre Church closed, she wasted no time in getting involved with services held in Galix. And once again, she works with the enthusiasm that we know of.

Every experience delivers a message; hardship stimulates her to go ever further. Having lost her father in 1976 to cancer when he was only 43 years of age, she is captivated by the dream of a young man who undertook the 'Marathon of Hope' in April of 1980. Debra soon becomes an ally on the front lines of the Terry Fox Foundation. Within her circle of friends, she applies herself at organizing a walk with a few people, growing in volume each year until all the schools in Port Cartier participate. To this day, 30 years later, grateful for her perseverance, more than eighty thousand dollars have been collected for this grand humanitarian effort. And we're not finished! In 2006, her dedication for this cause brings her to Chilliwack, British Columbia, to meet with none other than the parents of Terry Fox. We can easily imagine how Ms. Laurie was welcomed with great joy.

Another event to underline: in 2009, Debra received the Outstanding Community Involvement Award from the North Shore Community Association in recognition of her volunteer work. That same year, motivated by the challenge of giving the young and the old the 'want to exceed', Debra presents herself to the Coca-Cola Challenge. For the Vancouver Games, Debra wanted to raise another challenge: carry the Olympic Flame that was headed for Seven-Islands. Nothing less! And her dream becomes reality. She would carry the flame with all the enthusiasm that we know of but even more for being very proud of her town. These were, she said, *'the best seven minutes, 11 seconds of my life'*. But the race doesn't end here: Debra will be, before and during the games, a faithful propagandist. Thanks to many means of publicity, she supports the athletes who have participated in the Olympic Games.

Committed, enthusiastic and perseverant woman that she is, it is not surprising that Debra loves to travel. On many occasions, her devotion has brought her to grand pilgrimage sites in Europe. Her friends and acquaintances say *"Debra is a glowing believer"*.

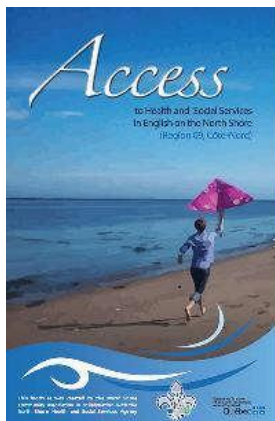
With her constant and unflinching commitment, it is not only Port Cartier, but all of the North Shore that benefit from her donations and commitment.

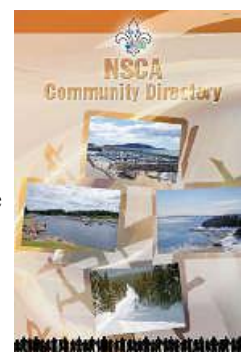

With 47 teams registered, the Baie-Comeau community exceeded their target goal in the 4th Relay for Life event. A littler over 600 walkers participated in this year's edition. Participants came from as far away as Portneuf-sur-Mer, Forestville and Pessamit to take part in this inspirational 12-hour overnight event.

This year, the Anglophone community team- "BCHS-CLC", raised over \$1 500 for this great cause - the fight against cancer. For the first time in four years of existence, Mother Nature and all her glory shuffled things around. Heavy rain and strong winds made it unpleasant and difficult for the walkers at times. REMEMBERING TERRY



As the organizer of the annual Terry Fox Run in the small town of Port-Cartier on the North Shore of the St. Lawrence River, I still find talking about Terry very difficult. The magnitude of the challenge he undertook continues to inspire me, and I am sad that I never had the chance to meet him in person. He was just two years younger than I am, and as I watched him dip his artificial leg in the waters off the coast of Newfoundland on April 12, 1980 (just 3 days before my 24th birthday), I remember thinking that this was no ordinary human being, much as he tried to tell us he was just that. I followed his progress that spring and summer through the Atlantic Provinces and into Quebec and Ontario, getting a lump in my throat every time he was interviewed and crying at the thought of how much pain he had already been through in his young life. He had won his battle with cancer at that point, but he had a dream, and that dream defined the remainder of his too short life.

The footage of Terry outside Thunder Bay, bravely facing the cameras and saying that if there was any way he could return and finish the Marathon of Hope he would, remains indelibly rooted in my memory. Every year I read Eric Walters' novel *Run* with my students, and when I reach that part of the story, I cannot read those words aloud. I have to ask a student to finish the chapter. Having lost my dad to lung cancer at the age of 43, I was drawn to Terry's dream and knew I had to pick up the torch so to speak. He made me proud to be Canadian, more than any Olympic athlete ever could.

When CTV asked viewers to do something spontaneous in conjunction with the telethon they were planning that September 1980, a good friend Donna, a fellow teacher Mary, and I mapped out a 10 km route, and a dozen kids from Riverview School raised a little over \$1000 and my involvement was sealed! Thirty years later, along with my colleagues and their students in the two primary French schools, we have raised almost \$80 000. I am proud to say that, in our isolated corner of Quebec, a new generation of students will know who Terry Fox is, what he tried to do, and why it is so important for them to dare to dream. In Canada, we need not look outside our boundaries for a better example of the POWER OF ONE. Thanks to Terry Fox, we are a nation united in a cause against an enemy we can all relate to.

"Somewhere the hurting must stop..." and "I believe in miracles." are but two of the reasons that motivated Terry. You need only watch one minute of film footage from the Marathon of Hope, and your life will never be the same again. On August 8th, 2006, I had the privilege of meeting Terry's parents and spending the afternoon with them at their home in Chilliwack, B.C. That remains a highlight of my life! Thanks, Betty and Rolly, for sharing your son with us.



I am reminded of Senator Edward Kennedy's final words in his eulogy to his brother Robert in June 1968: "Some men see things as they are and say why. I dream things that never were and say why not?" Thank you again, Terry, for believing in your dream and living it to the fullest!



The « **coopérative jeunesse de services** » (CJS) projects have been implanted in the province of Quebec for over twenty years thanks to the "Réseau de la coopération du travail du Québec". This year people from the Carrefour Jeunesse-emploi de Manicouagan, the Forum Jeunesse Côte-Nord, the Baie-Comeau Community Learning Center, the Coopérative Aspire-tout, the North Shore Community Association, the centre de Santé et des Services Sociaux de Manicouagan and the Caisse Desjardins de Baie-Comeau came together to start a Youth Co-op in the Baie-Comeau area. A CJS, or a "Youth Co-op", is a project that groups around fifteen teenagers, aged from 12 to 17, who, flanked by two animators, create their own summer job by starting a work co-op. The Local Committee's job was to raise enough money to get the project started and hire the two animators. Patrick Deraps and Kimberly Lamontagne, were hired as the animators and their mandate was to recruit the youth, give them workshops about cooperative work as well as supervise and help the teenagers with their project all summer. Together the teenagers

decided which services they wanted to offer, as well as organize activities to make their co-op and services known to the population.

The CJS has decided to offer some of the following services; lawn mowing, dog walking, babysitting, painting and other general maintenance work. They have also opted to offer certain special activities every other week. Some of the proposed activities are the following; carwash, movie nights for youth, all-nighter, day at the beach, spaghetti supper, etc.

The Health and Social Services **Networking and Partnership Initiative** **(HSSNPI)**

The HSSNPI project is advancing nicely since the last update. We have established our 'Network Table' consisting of fifteen members. We have representatives from the CSSS Manicouagan, CSSS Sept-Iles, various community organizations as well as the educational institutions and religious organizations that serve the English community.

We have also established a subcommittee in the Sept-Îles region (12 members) of community organizations serving the population in that area to give valuable feedback to the HSSNPI 'Network Table'.

The 'Network Table's' main objective is "to work together through cooperation and partnership to improve and maintain access to health and social services for the English-speaking population of the Côte-Nord Health Region 09". They have created an 'action plan' to follow for the year, including the analysis of all aspects of health and social services to find solutions aimed at improving access for the English-speaking population.

The NPI will also be promoting the Community Health Education Program (CHEP) which enables the NSCA to present videoconferencing sessions on various health topics in English. These have already met with great success in Baie-Comeau, and now with the new videoconferencing capabilities in Sept-Iles, we will be able to deliver the health sessions to the large English-speaking population there.

If any of our population out there is having a difficult time getting pamphlets and information on any health topic in English, please let us know and we will try to acquire some English documentation for you. You can reach us at the contact numbers below.

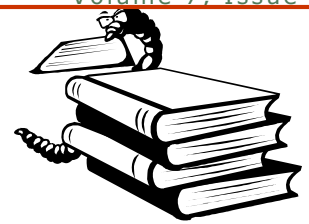

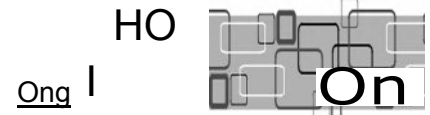
