

## Federal grant approved for a project targeted for English-speaking senior community of Sept-Iles

The North Shore Community Association (NSCA) is proud to announce a new project funded by the Department of Canadian Heritage to increase access to animation for the English-speaking senior community of the region of Sept-Iles and to undertake the long-term establishment of sustainable wellness activities for English-speaking seniors.

Based on a specific need expressed by the senior minority-language population of Sept-Îles, the proposed "Active Living for Older Adults" (ALOA) project will allow the Association to respond to community priorities as indicated in the Community Portrait of Sept-Iles.

The following activities will take place:

- Coordinate, improve and expand existing organizational activities that will contribute in building a permanent structure for the senior community.
- Provide a regular program of activities in English for seniors in the Sept-Iles area;
- Encourage seniors to participate in the development of their activities;
- Continue to mobilize volunteer seniors for community participation
- Evaluation and recommendations for future action plan that will formulate a regular program of scheduled activities
- Bring together a variety of public and community resources to establish a permanent structure to sustain a variety of activities and secure diverse, alternative funding after project is complete.



Even though she was only six years old, her grandmother allowed Phyllis to pick out a shirt to wear to school. She had picked an orange shirt that had attracted her eye. Excited about attending school, she wore the orange shirt with pride. When she got to school they took it away and she never saw the shirt again.

The Adult ED students watched a short video about Phyllis' story, and for this day they wore their t-shirts with pride.

# Join the NSCA's Book Club!


Do you enjoy reading and would love to meet friends or make new ones? Well then, join our English Book Club. There's no registration fee, just the cost of your book!

## **Network Shadowing**

As part of their health and social services Networking and Partnership Initiative, the NSCA participates in network shadowing. This past September 24<sup>th</sup>, Marilyn Durepos, NPI Coordinator and Jody Lessard, Executive Director, had the chance to visit the Megantic English-speaking Community Development Corporation (MCDC) in Thetford Mines, QC, a community organization serving the English-speaking communities of l'Amiante, Lotbiniére and l'Érable regions. The MCDC's English-speaking communities represents approximately 1% of the population – very similar to some of our communities.

There are a total of 19 NPI Networks across the province of Quebec receiving support from Health Canada and the Community Health and Social Services Network (CHSSN). They all striving to improve and maintain access to health and social



services for English-speaking communities. Each network is unique in their own way and yet surprisingly similar in others. MCDC's English-speaking community is very active and well organized, much like NSCA's.

Information exchanges such as these are a valuable resource. We not only get the chance to see the challenges in different communities, but also come back with innovative ideas and activities that we can adapt for our region.
