# **Toddler Time in Sept-Îles**



To begin the Winter Fun-themed session, children and adults played a bean bag toss game. Once everyone was present we began our theme of snow and ice. Arctic and Antarctic animals were discussed and how they stay warm in the winter.

Together, we conducted an experiment to fully understand how the animals stay warm using ice water and coating our fingers with shortening to simulate blubber. Colouring sheets of animals who live in the cold were provided for the children to colour while waiting between activities. The final activity was painting on ice. We discussed colours and how to make other colours (such as using blue and red to make purple). The quiet book contest was announced and explained to the parents and we began the sign up.

February 8th was announced for the next Toddler time with a Valentine's day theme.

### Story-Time in Port-Cartier





With an attendance of 18, this session was our largest story time ever! Ms. Story read four stories centered around the theme of snow. After the children participated in an activity of making snowflakes with pipe cleaners and beads. The parents who were there pitched in to help and Roxanne as well when she wasn't busy.

Many thanks to librarian Roxanne's willingness to come early, set up, help during story time, and clean up afterwards. She is a huge asset in the success of story time!

February 9th was announced to the participants as the next story time with a Valentine's day theme.

### Quit to Win! Challenge



Baie-Comeau, January 11th, 2019 – The Centre intégré de santé et de services sociaux (CISSS) de la Côte-Nord encourages all smokers of the region to break free from tobacco by registering to the Quit to Win! Challenge by February 4th, at <u>quitchallenge.ca</u>.

The Challenge is back for its 20th anniversary with a new promotional concept. The theme "Yes, you can stop smoking. We know you can" reminds smokers that they have the power to break free from this addiction and that the Challenge is there to help them. For 20 years, the Challenge has been the strongest supporter of future ex-smokers by offering them support and motivation. In 2018, 45% of participants surveyed said they had already tried quitting at least four times. That is why the Challenge continues to encourage smokers to keep trying to butt out and seek help, because the next attempt just might be their last.

By taking on the Challenge, participants commit to not smoking for 6 weeks, from February 4th to March 17th, 2019, which is a realistic and meaningful first goal, considering that 6 weeks without smoking means 6 times the chances of quitting for good! The Challenge is based on a proven approach: on average, 75% of participants manage to go 6 weeks without smoking. A campaign will specifically target young adults between the ages of 18 and 24, many of whom are smokers. The campaign highlights the concrete benefits of quitting such as saving money, and improving their appearance and fitness. Participants could also win a \$1,000 scholarship by registering at quittowinthis.ca.

On the North Shore, you can also receive free personalized support by contacting one of the stop smoking centres (list in annex). These centres have efficient practical tools to help you quit smoking at your own pace and based on your needs. You can also get a medical prescription for stop smoking aids such as nicotine patches, gums and lozenges in most stop smoking centres as well as with your physician or a pharmacist.

According to the data of the Institut de la statistique du Québec, just under one quarter (23%) of the North Shore population aged 15 and older smokes cigarettes on a daily or occasional basis, compared to 19% in Québec.

Secondary 5 students from Queen Elizabeth High School (QEHS) visited with English-speaking seniors in Sept-Îles on December 5<sup>th</sup> for a special NSCA Christmas activity. The gathering took place at the MOCSI gymnasium.

Seventeen students from the QEHS leadership class arrived at noon and happily got to work preparing a luncheon, decorating the tables and setting up games. Students presented seniors with gifts they had prepared themselves- hand painted plates and bowls which they had inscribed with thoughtful, positive quotes. The gifts are actual donations to the NSCA 50+ seniors and will be used for their other Wellness events throughout the year.

The 32 seniors in attendance and students socialized and played interactive games following lunch. The atmosphere was warm and cheerful as many seniors reminisced about their Christmases of old. Students reminisced as well since some of them had visited with the seniors when they were actually in Secondary I.

### The Loom: An Introductory Session

The NSCA partnered with Le Cercle de Fermier in Port-Cartier to present an introductory activity on how to use the Looms. There were four participants that joined the activity to learn how to weave a dish towel. The looms are always in popular demand for the members of the Fermier and the NSCA was fortunate to save a place in order to try the activity this close to the holidays.

A member of the Fermier was on hand to explain the steps in weaving and how to use the Loom properly. There were many mechanics in relation to weaving such as understanding the pattern used which was decided by using a combination of the foot pedals, passing the weaving thread through the thread that was put onto the machine,



testing the tension of the piece being made to ensure that the thread was neither too loose or too tight and how to use the handle to fit the thread together after each pass.

After close to four hours of hard work, the item was finished. There was a drawing for the winner of the handmade towel; Julie Hartt was the lucky winner. Those involved appreciated the activity and the opportunity to learn something new.

A special thanks goes out to the Cercle de Fermier in Port-Cartier for partnering with the NSCA to provide the activity and to Louise Chouinard, a member of the Fermier, who volunteered her time to help!

## **NSCA Respite Care Service in Sept-Îles**



The NSCA in Sept-Îles has launched a new senior program to provide an English respite care service. NSCA senior outreach employee, Tammy Mansbridge, has received training for her role, and has already been meeting with seniors and their caregivers in the town.

Alzheimer's disease and other neurocognitive disorders increase feelings of isolation for both senior and caregiver, and this service aims to redress those feelings. The program also aims to provide typical respite services aimed at releasing the caregivers. The visits offer stimulation activities and are varied depending on the needs of the senior, but companionship and friendship are always guaranteed.

### Eastern Shores School Board Registration 2019-2020

**The Eastern Shores School Board** serves all students eligible for English education in the Baie-Comeau, Port-Cartier, Fermont and Sept-Iles region. Our School Board provides general academic education at the elementary and high school levels in conformity with the norms established by the Quebec Ministry of Education.

#### Criteria for enrolment are:

- 1) To be eligible for **PRE-K**, your child must be 4 before **October 1**<sup>st</sup>, **2019**
- 2) To be eligible for kindergarten, your child must be 5 before October 1<sup>st</sup>, 2019
- 3) To be eligible for grade 1, your child must be 6 before October 1<sup>st</sup>, 2019
- 4) An original birth certificate for your child with both parents' names must accompany the request for admission
- 5) Certificate of eligibility for English Instruction.
