We look forward to our year ahead and would like to thank everyone for their support!






### A Word from the Chair

### Biblio-Aidants Thematic Booklets for Caregivers

The NSCA continues to maintain connection with community partners, "Biblo Aidants" and/or public libraries to obtain ESC resources to include in our Health Display Resource.

The Health Display Resource of thematic booklets informs caregivers about various illness and issues they face. Each booklet provides a list of organizations, a selection of relevant websites as well as reading and film suggestions.

All information in these booklets has been selected, analyzed and validated by trained librarians. Some of the topics include: Alzheimer's, Depression, Diabetes, Bereavement, to name just a few. The NSCA has these thematic booklets available in both the Baie-Comeau and MRC of Sept-Rivières offices. All community members and caregivers are welcome to drop by and check out the booklets.



### Diabetes: What's New?

When you hear the word "diabetes," your first thought is likely about high blood sugar. Blood sugar is an often-underestimated component of your health. When it's out of whack over a long period of time, it could develop into diabetes. Diabetes affects your body's ability to produce or use insulin, a hormone that allows your body to turn glucose (sugar) into energy.

There are several different reasons why someone may develop diabetes. The cause of diabetes depends on your genes, family history, ethnic background, and other factors such as the environment and your health. It also depends on the type of diabetes you have.



There is no common cause that fits every type of diabetes. The reason why someone will develop type-1 diabetes is very different from the reasons why another person will develop type-2 diabetes.

Diabetes is a chronic condition associated with abnormally high levels of sugar (glucose) in the blood. Insulin produced by the pancreas lowers blood glucose. The absence or insufficient production of insulin or an inability of the body to properly use insulin causes diabetes.

Please join us for a CHEP Videoconference on *Diabetes-What's New?* on November 20, 2019 from 10:00 a.m. to 12 p.m. The NSCA will be hosting this videoconference in Room 317 at the Baie-Comeau office located at 39 avenue Marquette and at the MRC of Sept-Rivières office located at 598 boulevard Laure, Local 106, Sept-Îles.

The videoconference will be led by Théa Demmers, P. Dt., M. Sc., who is involved with healthy lifestyle promotion, chronic disease prevention, and sports nutrition at Concordia University's PERFORM Centre.

# Anglican Diocese of Quebec to meet for its 85th Ordinary Session of Synod

The Rt. Rev. Bruce Myers, Bishop of the Anglican Diocese of Quebec, has summoned the 85<sup>th</sup> (Ordinary) Session of Synod of the Diocese of Quebec to meet on November 21, 22, 23, and 24, 2019 at the Monstère-des-Augustines, in Quebec City.

Synod is the diocese's governance meeting held every few years to make policy decisions, elect leadership and gather members of the diocese around worship and prayer. This Synod marks the first time the diocese will meet under revised guidelines approved in 2015 and under the leadership of Bishop Myers.

For this Synod, delegates have been elected by each deanery in the diocese. Kawawachikamach, the one Anglican Indigenous community within the diocese, has status as a separate region of its own and chooses two lay delegates to attend Synod. The Deanery of the North Shore (encompassing congregations from Baie-Comeau, Sept-Îles and the Lower North Shore is to be represented by six delegates: The Rev. Francie Keats, Jody Lessard, Dale Keats, Mary Spingle, Linda Stubbert, and Canon Stephen Kohner.

Myers has brought a different vision to Synod, increasing emphasis on worship and storytelling. It will provide an opportunity to examine the needs of the diocese, proposed changes to its governance, the diocesan budget and a time to examine its mission and ministry in the wide-spread territory of the diocese. A number of invited guests including the Most Rev. Linda Nicholls, primate of the Anglican Church of Canada, will be on hand to address and converse with delegates.

In an interview with the Quebec Diocesan Gazette, Canon Stephen Kohner, Secretary of Synod, said he was "ever hopeful" that the changes brought to this Synod, along with the fellowship and prayer in the meeting, would spark new ideas within the diocese. "It's also a time for synergy. We've got a lot of wonderful people out there, and Synod is probably one of the few times, if the only time, when we can put all the energy and the ideas and the missions together in one place. That's pretty exciting. That's wonderful."

### **NSCA** Visits the National Assembly


On October 8th, six community groups representatives were invited by Christopher Skeete, Parliamentary Assistant to the Premier for Relations with English-speaking Quebecers, to the National Assembly. The day started with a meeting luncheon with Mr. Skeete to discuss issues and concerns regarding our regions and communities. Early that afternoon, we attended the Question-Answer period in the Salon Bleu where Mr. Skeete addressed-in English-words of welcome to his invitees and acknowledging the presence of representatives from the English-speaking community during the afternoon parliamentary session.

Following the session, we were given a full tour of the National Assembly by our bilingual tour guide, who is originally from Sacré-Coeur on the Côte Nord. Our day ended with a short visit to the office of Liberal MNA, Gregory Kelley.

Both MNA's expressed their gratitude of having this opportunity to meet with representatives of the English-speaking community and hear what is happening in the regions.









# **English Respite Care Service**



The NSCA provides an English respite care service for caregivers of seniors in the MRC of Sept- Rivières.

Alzheimer's disease and other neurocognitive disorders increase feelings of isolation for both senior and caregiver, and this service aims to redress those feelings.

The program also aims to provide typical respite services aimed at releasing the caregivers. The visits offer stimulation activities and are varied depending on the needs of the senior, but companionship and friendship are always guaranteed.


### Coming to Quebec City for Medical Treatment?
