
"A Christmas Memory" Audio Book



Bill 101 Exemptions, Eligibility to English Education, and School Registration 2021-2022



As some might have noticed our current provincial government is looking to reform some of the Bill 101 exemptions that provide access to and English education in Quebec. Here are three of the main exemptions that make up for most of the requests for eligibility and are current and valid to this date. Registration of students wanting to attend English schools must register by February 19th, 2021.

Permanent Certificate of Eligibility - these are the most common situations that allow a child to receive instruction in English:

- those who have received the major part of their elementary or secondary school instruction in English in Canada;
- those whose brother or sister did the major part of his or her elementary or secondary studies in English in Canada;
- those whose father or mother did the major part of his or her elementary studies in English in Canada;
- those whose father or mother attended school in Québec after August 26, 1977, and could have been declared eligible for instruction in English at that time.

In the first two (2) cases, the father or mother of the child must be a Canadian citizen. In the third (3rd) case, the parent who studied in Canada must be a Canadian citizen.

Temporary Certificate of Eligibility:

Children who may receive temporary authorization to receive their education in English fall into three (3) categories. Exemption from the Charter

A child with a severe learning disability, as outlined in the government regulations under section 81 of the Charter of the French Language, may receive an exemption to attend an English school in Québec. This exemption is transferrable to the child's siblings but not to their descendants.

Workshops Provide Beneficial Resources to Community Members

In keeping up with new initiatives and societal demand, the NSCA partnered with the Centre d'Intervention - Le Rond-Point, to facilitate two workshops on December 1 and 2, 2020 in MRC Sept-Rivières. We all know people who have encountered problems with gambling or the use of drugs, alcohol, or medication which inevitably causes individual and group problems.

This valuable and well-respected community organization dedicates itself to helping people suffering from an addiction regain control of their freedom and help them find new opportunities for a new life. They provide support to families and employers by offering prevention workshops, materials for safer consumption, pre/post therapy sessions and individual meetings.

The NSCA took this opportunity to partner with Ms. Jannick Bizeau, from the Centre d'Intervention-Le Rond-Point in Sept-Îles as she animated two workshops on cannabis to our 50+ Wellness group in the MRC Sept-Rivières region. The workshop was well attended with 20 participants joining in.

The 50+ Wellness members walked away with a wealth of information which was relevant to them, their families and friends. They gained valuable insights on a community resource that some were not even aware of. The workshop shed light on what was considered 'taboo' but which is now fast becoming accepted in society. Our older adults were very positive, inquisitive, and asked many questions which were professionally responded to by this community organization. Overall, our older adults found this workshop very enlightening and they look forward to future presentations from Le Rond-Point. The feedback received from the participants included comments such as:

- "It was really an interesting session! I would even like to know a little bit more."
- "I was surprised that we learned so many things. The speaker made us very comfortable about the subject."
- "The presentation was very professional and well presented. The information was really helpful."

NSCA: Keeping Communities Informed

Albeit, while activities and events were mostly conducted virtually, the NSCA was able to provide these to our community members while keeping them engaged and motivated and assisting in breaking down social isolation. The Centre de justice et Proximité de Côte-Nord (CJPCN) facilitated workshop s/webinars on Harassment at Work, Psychological Harassment, Pardons, End of Life, and Fraud Prevention and Consumer Protection. Other workshop topics on cannabis and ageism were provided by Le Rond Point and OAS, respectively.

Stay tuned for our upcoming Caregiver's Conference with Jennifer Hobbs Robert on March 10, 2021, which will discuss the very important topic of dealing with end of life and the difficult decisions one must make at a critical time in our lives.
