

A Word from the Chair



BIBLIOTHÈ QUE dice-Lane

The NSCA is proud to partner with Alice-Lane Public Library in Baie-Comeau.

Since September 2021, three *Story Time* events have been held in the library, to the delight of parents and children (stay tuned for upcoming *Story Times*, as soon as Covid restrictions permit).

Starting at the end of January, the *Travelling Literacy Bags* will be available for loan in the library itself. Bring home *Dakota Dinosaur* to learn all about the importance of brushing your teeth or *Caley Cat* to read about music. All bags contain books for 0-2 or 3-5 years old and activity sheets adapted to each age group.

It's anticipated that the increased visibility will increase access to English resources and books in English for Baie-Comeau's English-speaking families as well as the population at large.





We're all Writers: Quebec Writers' Federation offers on-line Storytelling Workshop

Thanks to the Quebec Writers' Federation, author Nisha Coleman has teamed up with 7 North Shore participants in offering 3 on-line storytelling workshops. Via Zoom, the free workshop is offered on Sunday afternoons over a 2-hour period. In the first session of January 16, Nisha reviewed the effective traits of storytelling, had each participant tell a 1-2 minute story based upon an event of the past week, and had them write a short text based upon another memory. Homework was assigned - trying out "free-writes" based on a number of prompts and viewing of some storytelling videos.



The second workshop of January 23 will have the participants delve into and elaborate on one memory they wish to develop into an oral story. Nisha provided a short lesson and discussion on storytelling elements such as beginnings, endings, meanings, themes and symbolism. We also discussed characters in our stories and the use of dialogue.

In the final session of January 30, the beginning of the class will be devoted to questions and discussion about performance. Performance tips are provided including how to manage nerves. A storytelling "showcase" wherein each participant will share their story which is recorded (with consent). After each participant has shared their stories, a discussion about each piece will offer praise and feedback. Finally, a discussion will ensue on we discuss how storytelling can be used in everyday life.

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English Employability Services on the North Shore

In the past year, the North Shore Community Association has been working in partnership with community organisations that offer free employability services to the general public. POPCO (Port-Cartier), Centre Émersion (Baie-Comeau), and Action Emploi (Sept-Îles) are all now capable to offer employability services to the English population of their respective municipalities. With the support of the NSCA, these organisations can serve you in English to create your resumes, cover letter, interview practices, aptitude workshops, and help in the job searching activities you need to find a fulfilling job that you desire. The NSCA can also assist these organisations to translate your documents from English to French or vice versa. If assistance is needed to facilitate communication between the organisation and the client, the NSCA can appoint a bilingual person to be present with you.

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1000 Words: Digital Storytelling Project Underway

The communities of Baie-Comeau, Port-Cartier, and Sept-Îles are currently identifying themes in order to produce approximately 12 heritage-type audio-visual "photo albums" to be used in schools, tourism and socio-cultural and historical venues and displays. The work is on-going and is, somewhat, being slowed by COVID-19 restrictions. A number of "capsules" have been identified as significant and historically important - these are themes identified by the various communities and are in danger of being forgotten by the passage of time and the passing of our seniors.

To date, Baie-Comeau will start on research and stories of the Baie-Comeau Community Association (BCCA) which was the socio-recreational centre of the town from 1939 to 1969. There are hundreds of archival photographs to be reviewed; well interviews and community sessions are planned to hear the stories of times gone by.

Port-Cartier will focus in on Riverview School. It has been part of the fabric of the community since its inception and was the centre of community life.

Sept-Îles' focii is on Canadian Forces Base Moisie (part of the Pinetree line) that operated from 1953 to 1988. It attracted hundreds of people who worked, lived, and were educated on the base. A second theme is about life on the QNSL Railway line and how it contributed to the community.

There are two additional themes that are inter-related and transcend a number of communities: Social Teas and the Pulp and Paper industry. Anyone who wishes to tell their story is encouraged to contact Stephen Kohner at 418-295-3431.

By the end of this workshop, you will have all the information you need to make and to register your AMDs. It's free and easy to do! He will also discuss living wills, which are similar to AMDs but less formal.




