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On June 12, NSCA's 50+ Wellness community members, from the communities of Baie-Comeau, Port Cartier and Sept-Îles, gathered for a year-end wrap-up event at the Lighthouse (built in 1830) at Pointe-des-Monts (near Baie Trinite).

The Pointe-des-Monts Lighthouse team were proud to present the group with the official launch of their permanent exhibition accessibility project, and the viewing of the 'Phare de Pointe-des-Monts' heritage video project. In the presence of the Museum team, members of the Board of Directors, and part of the production team, two new tools were presented that were produced in French and English, enabling people with reduced mobility to enjoy an alternative experience allowing them to access the main themes just like other visitors, in terms of both quality and access to content.



LURE OF THE LIGHTHOUSE CONT'D....

Visitors with restricted mobility have access to the entire grounds, but their experience is not complete, as they cannot access all seven floors of the lighthouse. This means they can't experience the entire enhancement, either as part of a guided tour or on their own. People with physical or cognitive health problems (related, for example, to vertigo) face the same challenges. With the help of a digital creation firm specializing in museological projects, the Lighthouse team produced a short film presenting a brief tour of the physical premises by floor, as well as the historical content. The second tool, using a computer, allows visitors to take an autonomous self-guided virtual tour to access more precise content, and to visit each floor, at their leisure, and at their own pace without depending on their friends or relatives who are physically visiting the tower. Upon their return, they are able to chat together at the end of their respective visits.

A lovely day had by all, as we explored the grounds, the lighthouse, and had a lovely lunch in the company of friends.

The group also helped us promote the campaign for 'World Elder Abuse Awareness Day', which is recognized every June 15, by wearing purple ribbons.

A very special thanks to the staff at Pointe-des-Monts for coordinating and guiding our large group (40 participants) through the heritage video, lighthouse, grounds, and accommodating our needs as they arose. Outstanding service and a 'must see'!



EMPLOYMENT PROFILE OF ENGLISH-SPEAKERS IN THE CÔTE NORD

Webinar was held on June 6 where the Employment Profile of English Speakers in Côte-Nord was unveiled.

Insights were gained on:

- Language demographics
- Unemployment trends
- Income statistics
- Overview of work activity

PERT's report emphasizes the importance of increased collaboration and coordination between government and stakeholders in the English-speaking community and in developing programs to address the economic disparities outlined in the report.



Some of the key findings indicated in the report:

- English speakers constitute 6.1% of Côte-Nord's labour force, and they have a similar labour force participation rate to French speakers, 60.2% compared to 60.5%, respectively.
- However, English speakers in the Côte-Nord have an unemployment rate of 17.9%. This is more than double the unemployment rate of French speakers in the region (6.8%).
- English speakers earn a median after-tax income of \$34,800 and a median employment income of \$28,400. However, compared to French speakers, they earn \$4,000 less in after-tax income and \$11,200 less in median employment income.
- Less than half of English speakers are engaged in full-time employment (40.1%), compared to 55.0% among French speakers.
- Health care and social assistance is the industry with the highest vacancies in the region. The top 4 leading industries for English speakers in the Côte-Nord are 'Health care and social assistance', followed by 'Construction', 'Retail trade', and 'Educational services'.

"The findings in PERT's report highlight the pressing need for targeted action to support English speakers in the Côte-Nord. English speakers in the Côte-Nord deserve improved access to employment and training opportunities. As such, we are calling on the government to strengthen partnerships with local organizations serving English-speaking communities and increase support programs which allow for English speakers to improve their skills sets for workforce integration", continued Jody Lessard, Executive Director of the North Shore Community Association (NSCA)." We're thankful to have had the opportunity to come together and celebrate you on this wonderful occasion.

<u>What is it?</u> Built in collaboration with Autism Côte-Nord, the Lending Resource Library is a new service that offers an inventory of educational material, sensory tools and information accessible for Children on the Autism Spectrum and their Families.

<u>What is it good for and why use it?</u> Sensory difficulties are often present in children diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). Some even have very high needs that interfere with their day-to-day functioning. The use of sensory tools can, therefore, be an interesting avenue to explore with them. These types of tools are scientifically proven to reduce anxiety, increase calm and concentration.
