What's new in 2022-2023





Every organization looks to rebrand themselves to remain modern, up-to-date and reflect growth. This was no different for the NSCA. This year we hired a marketing firm to create a new logo and refresh the NSCA website. The results were very much noticed with a crisp, vibrant logo representing our communities on the North Shore. Our website will be easier to navigate making it more user friendly. The responses received from community members were very positive. Check it out at: www.quebecnorthshore.org.

This year the CHSSN produced a Baseline Data Report 2022-2023 based on the 2021 Census of Canada. A section is dedicated for Region 09 - The North Shore. It was surprising to note that the total population in this region is 87,420, with 5,300 being English-speaking (6.1%). We have now seen a slite increase of the English-speaking population since 2016. Moving forward, knowledge of this information assists the NSCA in developing programs and services for our English-speaking population..

We, at the NSCA, are proud to continue assisting the English-speaking communities in this region.



How do we know, as an organization, that we are meeting our objectives? Well, we measure the impact within the community by measuring participation in activities, events, information sessions attended, and in time staff spent assisting those who cannot attend in-person events. The impact in the community is seen by breaking down social isolation, acquisition of new information and friends, enhanced physical activity, and new skills (technology and others) learned, etc.

Community Development and Partnerships

Creating projects in collaboration with community partners, such as workshops, program delivery or pilot project, helps build a network and creates opportunities to share information, identify issues, challenges and solutions such as service improvements.

One such collaboration with our health partner, the CISSS Cote Nord, we promoted and disseminated information on CISSS's pilot initiatives: Pictogram-Directional Signage at Sept-Iles Hospital; Allô Program-Assistance Linguistic Liaison Orientation; and English-language customer agent.



The NSCA acts as a liaison between the English-speaking population and CAB Le Mirage by supporting and promoting the program Meals on Wheels.

We have translated 12 monthly menus and post these menus on the NSCA Facebook

In partnership with Eastern Shores School Board (ESSB), we were able to deliver a Parent Volet program with Pre-K students and parents; 3 schools have partnered for the program.

Partnered with Y4Y to help organize an intergenerational activity for their "Project Impact" with QEHS students

Y4Y Québec

Maintained partnership with Ville de Port Cartier, Ville de Sept-Iles, and Ville de Baie Comeau for early childhood activities at local libraries for English childhood literacy programs.

New partnerships developed with Hommes Sept-IIs to organize a bilingual event for Dads and tots.

With the NSCA participating on provincial, regional, local advisory and decision-making tables, we represent the needs and challenges of the English-speaking community and raise awareness of the English-speaking population's needs relevant to the North Shore region.

Arts, Culture and Heritage

The NSCA continues to support and promote community arts, cultural events, and heritage projects. Events, such as holiday socials, book club gatherings, community gatherings, and local arts and culture presentations, were promoted through our newsletter, website, and Facebook page.

Health and social services

Having a formal Health and Social Services Networking Partnership Initiative committee consisting of members from community organizations, the health and social services sector and the English-speaking community work together through cooperation and partnership to improve and maintain access to health and social services. By being informed, the NSCA keeps abreast of new and developing initiatives in this area which aids in providing an awareness and access to these types of services for the English-speaking population.

Through the Outreach component of the NPI (Network Partnership Initiative) our aim is to reach vulnerable and isolated English-speakers, and support them in accessing health and social services in English. We continue to identify these individuals, as well as their caregivers, and provide respite care through our programming financed through the APPUI program.

McGill Bursary Program

Continued NPI support is ongoing for the McGill Bursary Program, which has a focus on retaining graduating students remaining in the North Shore region after completing their studies in the health and social services sector meeting the needs of English-speaking Quebecers and reducing barriers to health and social services.

The bursary is intended to provide a financial incentive to bilingual students from selected Quebec regions with appropriate English and French language skills pursuing full-time studies in the area of health and social services in a government recognized educational institution within their region.



Mental Health and Wellbeing

The COVID-19 pandemic certainly took its toll on the population, especially more so, on our youth. Surveys completed by the CHSSN indicated that youth experienced a great deal of anxiety and stress during this time and some are still experiencing residual symptoms. It quickly became apparent that raising awareness of mental health issues was important for our youth.


To meet these identified needs, the NSCA contracted with Le Clinique Le Marais in Sept-Îles to create mental health capsules, on a variety of mental health issues, for youth, seniors, and families, raising an awareness about mental health.


